Go Nuts: Place large pinecones in a bowl with nuts and colored balls to decorate the table. Keep them natural, or glitter them up. Surround the bowl with a dry grass wreath to give a light, ethereal transition from the centerpiece to the table.

Get Bobble: Add clear, tinted, or

sparkled glass bobbles to your trailing greens. Hang lightweight glittering ornaments from your wall sconces and chandeliers. Play with scale: add lots of tiny ones to reflect a lot of light, or go withoversized orbs for sophisticated drama.

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WHAT ARE THE BENEFITS OF A LIVING TRUST?

There is a lot of confusion regarding esate planing, and it tends to make people fearful about the process. A good option is creating a living trust.

A probate is a court process in which the court makes sure that when you die all your debts are paid and your assets are transferred to your beneficiaries as per your will. With a living trust, title to your assets is transferred during your lifetime to the trustee(s) of your living trust (usually yourself to start), to hold as trustee under your living trust. Because title is already in the name of the trustee at the

time of your death, by law the trustee automatically has title or succeeds to title under your trust, and can pay your debts and distribute your trust estate without a court order.

A living trust can be amended or revoked by the grantor unless for some reason he or she specifically provides that it will be irrevocable.


Give the Greatest Gift
