## Create a Wall Photo Collage

If you're creating a photo collage for a growing family, frames can be used

For a random effect, paper templates can be made of all your frames. Starting at the middle of the wall, arrange the paper rectangles and squares to create a pattern using uniform spacing between the templates. You work the layout upand-down and side-to-side until achieving a balanced look. Once the layout looks visually pleasing, begin hanging the actual frames starting from the middle and working out, while keeping the spacing even.
